- Often a Civil War Veteran has his unit inscribed on the tombstone.
- Check for flag & brass/bronze marker holding flag.

- 7. Sometimes you can find out about military service from an old photograph
- 8. "GAR" Grand Army of the Republic
- The "GAR" was a Veteran's Organization.
- Founded on April 6, 1866, membership was limited to honorably discharged veterans of the

Union Army, Navy, Marine Corps or the Revenue Cutter Service who had served between

April 12, 1861 and April 9, 1865.

- The last member of "GAR" died in 1956, at the age of 109.

- Civil War veterans often had their service time included in their obituary.

- Often biographical sketches and county histories will show the names of those enlisted

during the Civil War.

- They may include a group picture of the military unit if it was composed of local men.

- 14. My Cousin from Waterford, WI
- BIOGRAPHY: Frederick W. Henningfeld served in the Civil War. His picture was printed in

the Racine County Millitant. I also have his Civil War pension records. He served in

Company "A", 43rd Regiment, Wisconsin Infantry. Frederick W. Henningfeld was listed in

his parents probate record. Parents were shown as William and Elizabeth Henningfeld.

Frederick was my 1st Cousin, three times removed.

- 15. 1890 and 1910 US Census
- The 1890 census was partially destroyed by fire.
- The sections that survived include a listing of Civil War veterans.
- The 1910 census had a specific line asking if the person had been in the Union or

Confederate Army or Navy.

- 53. Records are not cheap.

Pension = \$80, Service = \$30

- 54. What might I find in a Pension Record?
- Birth information, marriage information, death information.
- Locations of events.
- Statements of your ancestor's employment, service, health, physical description, wages,

places where he lived.

- List of children living or dead, their date and place of birth.
- Sometimes they tore the pages out of their family bible and sent them to Washington DC.
