

INTERNET SECURITY by BILL HECK

Perfect refresh to tighten up our defenses against the ever-evolving world of scammers, breaches and viruses – oh my! What a time it is. Bill covered many topics and blended updates from past subjects and several new things to pursue in our increasing need to keep our information secure.

Please see the handouts to reference all topics covered but here are some highlights:

- SCAMS you may see these come in all forms but mostly emails or texts. Often, they can be successful with the tactics they use such as:
 - FAMILIAR ORGANIZATIONS
 - WALMART, UPS, JP Morgan Chase, IRS, and more
 - Bank alerts are common
 - PROBLEM or a PRIZE
 - Your account has a problem
 - Take a survey-win a prize
 - OVERWHELMING URGENCY
 - Pay now or further costs
 - Limited time offer today only
 - PAY WITH GIFT CARDS
 - Has problem with using standard methods so let's do it in gift cards

- OUR BEST SOLUTIONS
 - CONTACT SOURCE DIRECTLY
 - They say there is a problem with your tax refund. Don't click or give any information. Call the IRS directly to see what or if there is a real concern or not.
 - LOOK AT THE DOMAIN
 - For emails, look for
 - Other country endings
 - Poor grammar
 - Misspelling
- **PASSWORD SECURITY** IMPORTANT
 - PASSWORD MANAGERS
 - There are many options, but a very good option to help keep track and generate very strong passwords
 - Worth your while to make passwords strong.
 Difference between hackers taking days or years to crack your information.

MULTIFACTOR AUTHENTIFICATION -

- Another worthwhile benefit.
- Added level can be the difference between account access being safe or vulnerable.
- AI & VOICE CLONING updates

- Bill played the \$10K offer from last year (still makes me giggle) and some new ones.
- AI is advancing and starting to be used for just about everything.
- Stay aware and current question it.
- Again Contact the source directly
- DELIVERY FAILURE NOTICES
 - Keep track of your expected deliveries
 - Contact the source outside of the original form of contact

Bill had some great resolutions as reminders:

- 1. Be cautious with your email
- 2. Never send information to strangers
- 3. Do research before payments and purchases
- 4. Use best judgement when you do have to share personal information
- 5. Use different strong passwords for each account
- 6. Enable 2-factor authentication where possible
- Be smart about social media and what you post or comment on. May reveal more about you than just a fun quiz.
- 8. Regularly check your purchase and banking statements
- 9. Continue to educate yourself on the latest scams to try to make it incredibly difficult for the criminals.

ANTIVIRUS & SECURITY by SAM COLON

We had a second presentation by Sam about some additional concerns that could affect your hardware and contacts from your computer. Staying safe is no accident. Invest in protection as it is all about protecting you and your information.

Here are some highlights from Sam:

- MANY THINGS CAN ATTACK
 YOUR COMPUTER THROUGH
 INCOMING INFO
 - ADWARE / MALWARE
 - SURVEILLANCE
 - KEY LOGGERS
 - VIRUSES
 - TROJANS
 - ROOTKIT
 - PUP
 - DIALER

• SCAMS – ADDITIONAL ONES

- Family in distress
- Charity scams
- Tech-support scams

• DATA BREACHES

 Recent one from National Public Data clearing house that confirmed 2.9 billion people's information including social security numbers, banking info, medical health information was breached and is out on the dark web.

- It is worth doing some of these steps to protect your information from leaked damages:
 - Get a free credit report
 - For concerns freeze your credit while you work on investigating and correcting
 - Sign up for credit monitoring service – invest in safety

• THUNDERBIRD EMAIL SERVICE

- Helps identify and protect your email from much of the spam that may contain many of the threats
- FREE program

CONTROL+SHIFT+ESCAPE

- If you find yourself in a scam or scareware or fake virus – DO NOT CLICK THE "X"
- Choose instead to click simultaneously the CTRL, SHIFT, ESC

HOW TO CHOOSE BEST PROTECTION PROGRAMS

- AV-COMPARATIVES
 - They are unbiased testing house in Innsbruck Austria for independent testing for antivirus programs.
